

Hospital Pastoral Care Remember (a) if you are going in to hospital and want Confession and the Sacrament of the Sick, please ask Fr Mitchell or Fr Sulik before you go, (b) if you are taken in as an emergency ask the nurse to contact the on-call chaplain or call the parish, and (c) if you are in hospital for a longer time you can receive Holy Communion regularly in the ward, but only if you ask the nurse or contact the parish. The chaplains will not be told you are in hospital and cannot visit you automatically – you must specifically ask to see the Catholic chaplain

Shroud Of Turin As we approach the time of Good Friday and Easter in the Church's calendar, focus increases on one of the most fascinating of Christian relics – the Shroud of Turin. Many believe that this is the actual shroud that the body of Jesus was wrapped in after his crucifixion, and it certainly is the most discussed and most examined relic in Christendom. David McKenzie, a parishioner, is a member of the British Shroud of Turin Society; David will be giving an illustrated talk about the Shroud, its history, why it causes so much controversy and the unanswered questions that still surround it. This talk will be after the 12:00 mass (around 1:30p.m.) in the Ogilvie Centre on Sunday 22nd February. A buffet lunch and refreshments will be available. Assisted Suicide Bill: Ask MSPs to vote 'No' on Bill to legalise Assisted Suicide. Parliament has rejected safeguards to help the most vulnerable live and is expected to hold a final vote in February/March 2026 on a bill which will decide whether assisted suicide becomes legal in Scotland. Such a bill will undermine the right to life and put vulnerable people at risk of coming under pressure to end their lives prematurely. At this stage the best thing to do is to arrange a surgery appointment with Constituency and List MSPs and speak directly to them. The MSPs that represent you want to know what you think. If they vote against, they must be able to say that people have contacted them and expressed this view.

Octave of Prayer for Christian Unity 2026

In 2026, the **Week (or Octave) of Prayer for Christian Unity** will be observed from **18th to 25th January**, as is traditional in many parts of the world. This period bridges the feasts of **St. Peter** (18 January) and **St. Paul** (25 January), symbolising unity in the diversity of the Church.

The **theme for 2026** is drawn from **Ephesians 4:4**:

"There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling."

This theme invites Christians to reflect on the deep spiritual bond that unites all believers in Christ, despite denominational differences. The focus will be on:

Unity in diversity – recognising different traditions as part of one body.

Shared mission – working together for justice, peace, and reconciliation.

Prayer and fellowship – strengthening relationships through worship and dialogue.
