


St BRUNO was born in Cologne and studied at the Cathedral school at Rheims, and on his return to Cologne about 1055, was ordained and became a Canon at the Cathedral. He returned to Rheims in 1056 as professor of theology, became head of the school the following year, and remained there until 1074, when he was to be appointed chancellor of Rheims by its archbishop. He became a hermit instead and moved on to Grenoble with six companions in 1084. They were assigned a place for their hermitages in a desolate, mountainous area in the Alps called



La Grande Chartreuse, by Bishop St. Hugh of Grenoble, who took Bruno as his confessor. They built an oratory and individual cells, roughly followed the rule of St. Benedict, and thus began The Carthusian Order. Though as yet they had no written rule they embraced a life of austere poverty, hard manual work, rigorous prayer, and transcribing manuscripts. Despite their wish for obscurity their fame spread, and in 1090, Bruno was brought to Rome, against his wishes, by Pope Urban II (whom he had taught at Rheims) as Papal Adviser in the reformation of the clergy. Bruno persuaded Urban to allow him to resume his monastic life. Bruno wrote several commentaries on the Psalms and on St. Paul's letters. He was never formally canonized because of the Carthusians' strong aversion to any public honours, but Pope Leo X granted the Carthusians permission to celebrate his feast, (6th October) in 1514, and his name was placed on the Roman calendar in 1623

OUR LADY OF THE ROSARY

According to Dominican tradition, in 1206, **St. Dominic** was in the south of France, attempting to convert the Albigensian heretics back to the Catholic faith but having little success until one day he received a vision of the Blessed Virgin, who gave him a set of Rosary beads as a prayerful aid to his ministry. While Mary's giving the rosary to St. Dominic is generally thought to be a holy legend, the development of this prayer form owes much to the Dominicans. At a time of great threat to Europe, in 1571 the Dominican Pope, St Pius V, led a Rosary Procession through Rome after which the feast day was established in thanksgiving to God.
