St Stephen

St Stephen was the first Christian Martyr, and his preaching and death are fully described in the Acts of the Apostles. At his death he witnesses to Jesus Christ being in heaven. One of the spectators at Stephen's stoning is Saul of Tarsus, later to become St Paul.

St John the Evangelist

The disciple 'whom Jesus loved'. His Gospel is the most profound and thoughtful of the 4 Gospels. Notable incidents in it are the Marriage Feast of Cana, and the Raising of Lazarus.

Fiducia Supplicans On the Pastoral Meaning of Blessings

The Church recognises the dignity of all people and does not define or label them in terms of their sexual orientation. Every one living on the face of the earth has personal problems and difficulties, but has challenges to growth, strengths, talents and gifts as well. The Church insists that every person has a fundamental identity: a creature of God, and by grace, his child and heir to eternal life. All are precious in the eyes of God.

The Catholic Church is called to present to all ages a demanding understanding and ethic of marriage and sexuality, one that is often difficult to realise in practice but which all should continually strive to make their own. The Church is also aware that people may fail to live consistently what she teaches. Pastoral understanding is brought to bear on such failure; the

Church does not reject us but wishes to walk with us in order to guide us to a fuller understanding and realisation of the teaching she holds to be God- given.

It is in this context that Pope Francis has approved a new document: **Fiducia Supplicans'** on the Pastoral Meaning of Blessings. The Church's teaching on marriage has not changed, and this declaration affirms that. It makes a distinction between liturgical (sacramental) blessings, and pastoral blessings. When two people who desire God's loving grace in their lives request a pastoral blessing, even if their situation as a couple is defined as 'irregular' it will be possible for the ordained minister to consent, for each of us needs God's healing love and mercy in our lives.

However, it adds that this 'gesture of pastoral closeness' must avoid any elements that remotely resemble a marriage rite, a liturgical blessing.

In this way, it concludes, every brother and every sister will be able to feel that, in the Church, they are always pilgrims, always beggars, always loved, and, despite everything, always blessed.
