

Juniata College

Located in a safe and beautiful learning environment set in the Allegheny Mountains of central Pennsylvania, Juniata College, a nationally known liberal arts college, has rich traditions and academic experiences that flexibly support learners. The beautiful 110-acre main campus is supplemented by a 315-acre nature preserve. In addition, Juniata's 365-acre Raystown Field station located nearby on Pennsylvania's largest inland lake provides one of the most distinctive opportunities in Environmental Science in the nation. A modern business incubator and entrepreneurial center is just a short walk from central campus.

Our 1,300 students engage in a challenging, flexible curriculum that encourages them to explore all intellectual interests, and to combine those interests into self-designed majors. Students are taught in small classes by energetic professors who are deeply invested in student success. Countless opportunities abound to learn by doing; about 95 percent of Juniata seniors participate in internships, studying abroad, volunteering for local service agencies, leading student organizations, starting their own business, or working on individual research, Juniata students learn early in their education how to make things happen. And a lively, friendly campus offers plenty of learning and entertainment activities outside of the classroom.

Juniata graduates find success at all levels. Ninety-four percent of students who graduate from Juniata do so in four or fewer years. Over the past five years 90 percent of students who applied to professional schools, such as medical and law school, were accepted. In recent years, 90 percent of our students attend graduate school or secure employment within six months after graduation.

Our alumni are invested in Juniata's vision, ensuring student success by offering counsel, networking advice or internships. At Juniata, students are challenged to think and grow intellectually, approach choices with growing confidence, and graduate as active, successful participants in the global community.

Concert Choir

Composed of 40 students from the College, the auditioned members of the Concert Choir come from several academic disciplines available at Juniata. Although there is no music major at Juniata, choir members' dedication and commitment to sharing the beauty of choral music provides meaningful experiences for both singer and listener. With annual spring tours and frequent summer tours, Juniata choirs have presented concerts in The Cathedral of St. John the Divine (New York City), National Cathedral (Washington DC), Chicago Temple (Chicago), St. Patrick's Cathedral (New York City), Salzburg Cathedral (Austria), Kreuzkirche Dresden (Germany), Kaiser-Wilhelm-Memorial Church Berlin (Germany), Cathédrale de Notre Dame Reims (France), Cathédrale de Notre Dame Chartres (France), Schlosskirche Wittenberg (Germany), St. Mark's Venice (Italy), La Cathédrale de Lausanne (Switzerland), St. Mary's Cathedral Sydney (Australia) and other significant performing venues. Recent Concert Choir tours include China, (2014), Costa Rica (2015), Germany (2015), Hungary & Czech Republic (2016), Ireland (2017), Vietnam (2018), Germany/Switzerland/France (2019), and Morocco (2019). The 2020 Chile and 2021 Kosovo tours were canceled by the pandemic.

Music Department

The primary goal of the Music Department is to increase students' understanding of music as a form of creative expression. Departmental courses and activities offer students the opportunity to develop their abilities as performers and listeners in order to perceive the subtleties of musical expression, as well as to approach music as a reflection of the cultures in which it is found. The Music Department is located in Swigart Hall which contains faculty studios and offices, practice rooms, and classrooms. Recitals, rehearsals, and concerts take place in Rosenberger Auditorium, an 800-seat concert hall.

H. Alfred Hockley '29 Concert Choir International Tour Endowment
